Course Description: Florida is one of the most dynamic, most interesting, and most unusual states in the union. This

course is a short survey of governing the Sunshine State, with perspectives from law, political science, and history. Students will leave with an understanding of the institutions, actors, and

processes which govern Florida.

Class Schedule: Assignments and dates are subject to change; the instructor will provide advance notice of any

change during class time.

Grading: Attendance/Discussion 50% Come to class, be prepared to discuss the readings

Oral Presentation: 10% *Ten-minute presentation on a state agency.*

Bill Analysis: 10% A two-page bill analysis of a bill or current event as assigned.

One or Two Quizzes: 20% On assigned readings, if readings are not done.

Professional Resume 10% Final exam.

Course Objectives By the end of this course, students will understand the structure and functions of Florida's

government, be able to analyze the separation of powers in the state's system, evaluate the influence of lobbyists, trade groups, and advocates, and analyze some policy bills. Students will

also be able to identify career paths and structure a political resume.

Course Expectations You are expected to exemplify high academic and professional standards. This course will

usually include a weekly in-person Friday meeting in two parts, a session with Mr. Chris

Emmanuel, Director of the UF State Relations Office to discuss "Governing Modern Florida," and a TIP Speaker Series guest speaker. Together, your Friday meeting will last two hours with a break between each session. Prepare for these Friday meetings ahead of time. Your first-class meeting will be Friday, January 17, 2025, and the speaker series will begin at subsequent Friday morning meetings and possibly last through the Florida Legislative Session.
